


FDR Wheelchair Statue Campaign Archive Release

In March 2021, U.S. Senator Tammy Duckworth (D-IL) and U.S. Representative Eleanor Holmes Norton (D-DC) introduced a resolution recognizing the successful campaign led by disability advocates to add the wheelchair statue at the FDR Memorial and urging the National Park Service (NPS) to make the Memorial accessible to everyone and support the development of accessible educational materials for visitors. *Time Magazine* covered the story – check it out!

Released the Accessibility at the FDR Memorial Report

In May, we had one of our biggest successes of the year: the release of a report on accessibility challenges at the FDR Memorial. The report, completed by Dr. Cheryl Fogle-Hatch, founder of MuseumSenses, outlined the deficiencies ranging from the difficulties with accessing information for blind and low vision visitors to safety concerns with



A Look Ahead to 2022

25th Anniversary of the Franklin Delano Roosevelt Memorial

Wednesday, May 11, 2022 Washington, D.C.

This special event will be hosted by Jonathan Capehart, opinion writer, *The Washington Post*, and anchor, "The Sunday Show with Jonathan Capehart" on MSNBC. The event will celebrate this historic and iconic memorial and provide an opportunity to engage in meaningful discussions around the memorial, its impact, and what more we can do to ensure that it is a lasting dedication, not only to President Roosevelt, but to millions of Americans and persons with disabilities who visit the memorial each year.

Launch the DC Disability Rights Heroes Project

The FDR Memorial Legacy Committee has received the 2021 Humanities Mini-Vision Partnership Grant in the amount of \$15,000. The grant will allow the FDR Committee to launch the DC Disability Rights Heroes Project, funded by the HumanitiesDC, to provide lesson plans to preserve and promote the heroic stories of disabled leaders who fought to add the life-sized, free-standing statue of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt in a wheelchair to the FDR Memorial. The FDR wheelchair statue story provides a significant opportunity for teachers and students to learn about disability history. The lesson plans will feature rich stories in which students can relate, see themselves, and also project their hopes onto their future selves.

January 30, 2022 marks FDR's 140th Birthday. The FDR Committee will be celebrating and honoring his legacy with a wreath-laying at the Memorial with students from Washington, DC's Browne Education Campus. More details to come, but we encourage you to join us.
